General Elections 2019 in Sirsa Parliamentary Constituency of Haryana

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ABSTRACT

Numerous causes contributed to the BJP party's stunning victory. Nationalistic sentiments have driven a wave of support for the BJP government at the federal level, especially in the wake of the Pulwama event in Jammu & Kashmir that targeted security personnel. The level of transparency in the administration of the Haryana state government was a key factor in the Lok Sabha elections in the region. Additionally, the INLD and the Congress have swapped control of the Sirsa parliamentary constituency, which is the focus of this study. The Modi wave broke numerous trends in Sirsa this time around with a competent woman, something that is unusual in Haryana politics after failing to buck the trend in 2014. The current article also examines the role of caste in the Sirsa Parliamentary constituency elections in addition to the variables.

INTRODUCTION

The 17th Lok Sabha was elected in India's 2019 general election, which took place between April 11 and May 19, with the highest turnout ever of 67% and a higher turnout of female voters. Most of the results were made public on May 23, the day after the counting was complete. So, with 303 seats, the Bhartiya Janta Party (BJP) prevailed. In addition, the National Democratic Alliance (NDA), which is led by the BJP, won 353 seats with 45% of the national vote. Despite claiming to be the leader of the opposition, Congress only succeeded in winning 52 seats, while the United Progressive Alliance won 91. It's critical to keep in mind that for the same, 55 seats, or at least 10%, must be open. At the national level, dynastic politics, economic performance, national security and terrorism, unemployment and rural misery, and the erosion of institutions were the primary issues.
