Mediation Centre at the High Court level is working under the committee comprises of High Court judges and first puisine judge is being the chairman and patron of the committee is chief justice of the respective Highcourt. Now the High Court is working at a very grossroot level in organizing awareness programme, mediation training programme, judges training programme.

Tamil Nadu High Court has played a very pivotal role in justice delivery system through incorporating international practices and implementing new techniques .
